

Worksheet 2: Animal Rights Working Animals

Some say he's too thin and that it's cruel for a dog to work so hard. I say it's cruel to try and stop him. Take him away from his 'purpose in life' and it'd be like taking a fish out of water. Blue heelers were bred to work sheep and cattle – it's in their blood.
